



June EOQ Thank You

Clerkship Updates & Changes: Dr. Keen and Dr. Cawse-Lucas provided an [overview](#) of the changes made to the Family Medicine Clerkship for the 2020-2021.

- The clerkship will be shortened from 6 to 4 weeks
- The PCOF requirement will be reduced to 3-4 observations.
- The test will be administered remotely on the final Friday, so the last day of clerkship will be the final Thursday (no travel day).
- Excused absences are reduced from 2 to 1 and are highly discouraged.
- Sites should provide PPE, but students have completed the [CDC PPE Training](#) module.
- We recommend that students avoid seeing patients with known or suspected COVID. Please see the [UWSOM Plan for Resumption of Student Clinical Activities](#) for more information.

Telemedicine: The adoption and use of Telemedicine services has expanded greatly as a result of the COVID-19



Dr. Nikki Gentile, who has piloted a remote precepting model at the UW FM Residency, presented a variety of best practices and techniques for [precepting residents](#), which may be adapted to medical students.

We are going adapt the PCOF for telemedicine encounters. As you teach students in telemedicine settings, please think about what sections are most useful and what is missing, and come prepared to discuss at the October EOQ.

UW Response to Current Events: In addition to our current national crisis with COVID-19, the death of George Floyd raised calls for racial justice as well policing reform. Dr. Larry Kirven, clinical dean for Wyoming and part of the diversity subcommittee, presented an [update on the learning environment at UWSOM](#) as well as materials and tips regarding implicit bias, microaggressions, and anti-

racism. [Remembering that this is a first rotation for many of the students, a careful orientation to the clinic is an important first step.](#) We discussed how clerkship faculty can learn more, which resulted in ideas for a journal club or faculty book club to regularly discuss bias and anti-racism.
