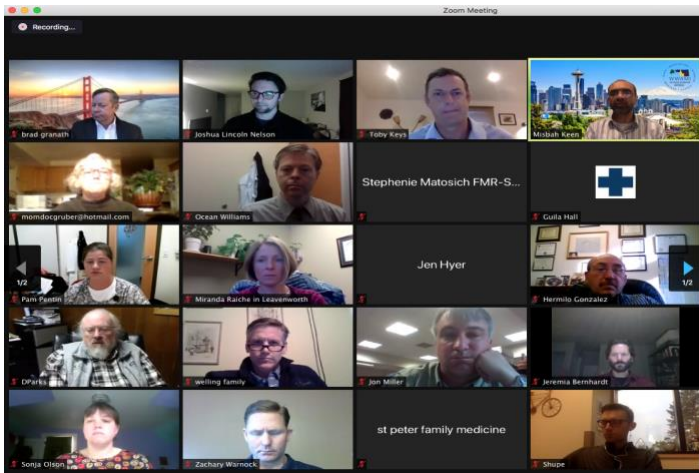


Oct EOQ Thank You

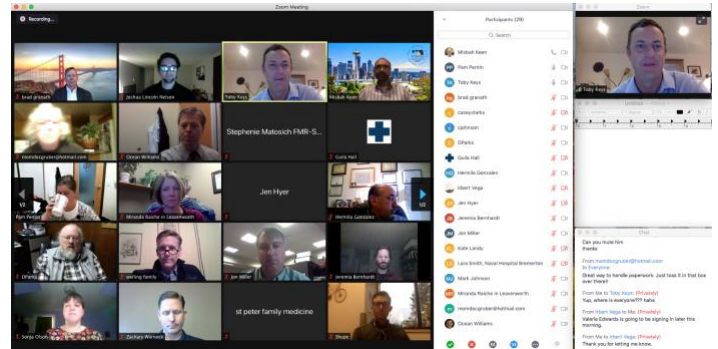

Takeaway #1: A number of changes to clerkship objectives and grading criteria are expected for the upcoming academic year 2021-2022, when we return to 6 week

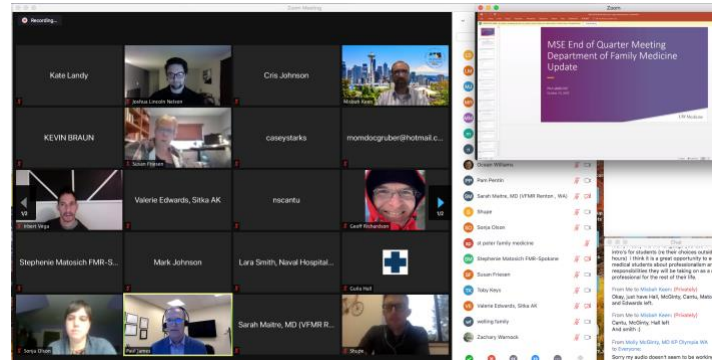


rotations. There will be further discussion of these changes at the next EOQ on March 5, 2021.

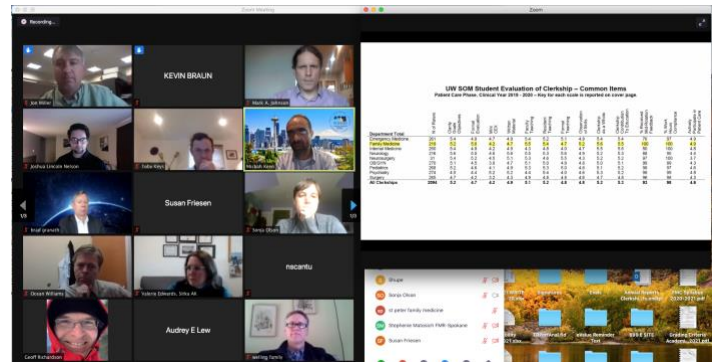
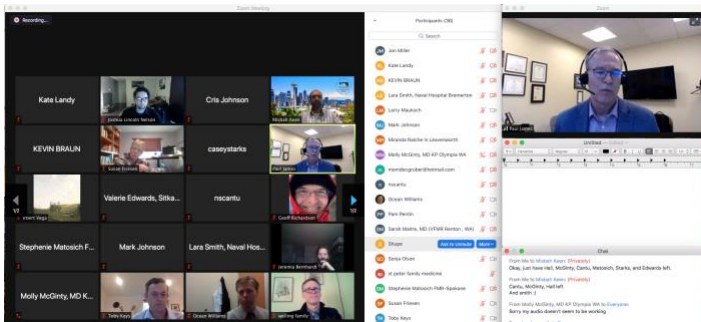


Presentation Summaries

Clerkship Updates & Evaluation:

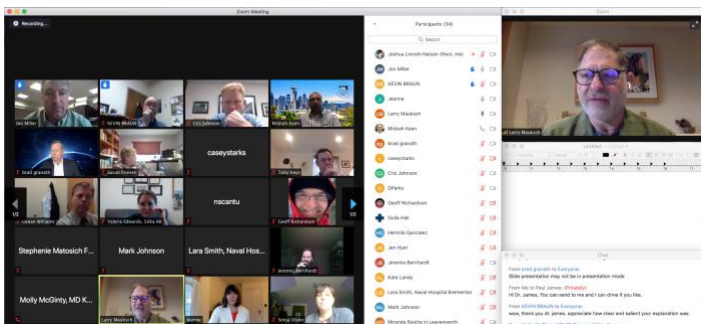
Dr. Keen and Mr. Keys provided an overview of the changes to the overall clerkship evaluation and addressed a number of subjects including grade distribution for the previous academic year, grade challenges and appeals, changes to be made to objectives and grade anchors. The return of the clerkship to 6 weeks rotations from

4 weeks was also addressed and discussed in addition to the audience having a chance to speak about the unique challenges they and their students have faced with the shorter rotations this year.



Department of Family Medicine Updates:

Dr. James spoke about the current state of the department, including our 50th anniversary, COVID-19, financial challenges, publications and news/media mentions, changes to facilities for clinical care, our residency & UWFMR network, new programs, research, and our ranking in UW News & World Report's Family Medicine Rankings.



PCOF Update:

Dr. Mauksh and Dr. Cawse-Lucas presented the potential formulation and adaptation of the PCOF for expanded use with respect to telemedicine and had a lively and productive discussion with our Site Directors in attendance on the further development of this educational instrument

Introduce yourself

Set up an interpreter first

Use a clear introduction that includes your role and ensures a safe space

- o "Hi I'm Dr. Singh, it's great to meet you. Could you please verify your name (and DOB)? What may I call you?"
- o "Could you please verify that you are in a private place where only the people you'd like to be in the room are with you?"

Consider showing your ID badge with credentials & panning the camera to show a private space
